
be glad you did. A scout is brave, right? So if you say you are a scout then stay in it and trust me, it will be worth your while.

Shopping on a Budget

Have you ever wondered why the adults often eat so much better than the scouts? One of the reasons is we have learned the art of shopping on a budget. Now we would like to share some of these skills to you. The tips below will also help you as an adult when you are shopping for groceries for yourself or your family.

First make a complete menu and then create your shopping list from the menu. Don't forget to include condiments, seasonings and supplies you need. Here's a good example.

Second, shop for the important items first and then use whatever money you have left for extras. (Don't buy dessert until you have your Steaks, Potatoes and Vegetable.)

Menu: (6 people)	List:
• Steak	6 Steaks
• Vegetables	3 bunch Broccoli
• Baked Potatoes	6 Potatoes
• Dessert	2 stick, butter
	Garlic/seasonings
	Steak sauce
	Sour Cream
	Dingdongs

Third, if possible, find deals on the more expensive items on your menu (especially the meats) even if you have to shop at different stores. Ask your parents or other adults to suggest where the best prices are on particular items.

Finally, here are some additional tips to use when you shop:

- **Keep track of your spending** – Use a calculator or piece of paper to add the prices of the items you pick up. Not only to you know how much you're spending, you also have an idea later on what you can put back if you run over budget.
- **Check the prices** – Most stores have tags on the shelf with the item price and the price per unit. These will help you make good buying decisions.
- **Find the bargains** – Don't just grab the Juice or Milk your parents always purchase. For many items, generic and store brands save you money and are just as good as name brands. Also, prices change and what is cheap this week is not next week. Look for store specials and instant coupons for more savings.
- **Stick to the budget** – If your menu is too expensive for your budget, you'll have to adjust while you're in the store. See what you can substitute. If steaks are too expensive, switch to pork chops or chicken. Get barbecue sauce instead of steak sauce. Improvise.

7. What is the cost of 40 boards 12 inches wide and 16 ft. long at \$20per meter?
8. Find bank discount on \$300 for 90 days (no grace) at 10 percent.
9. What is the cost of a square farm at \$15 per acre, the distance around which is 640 rods?
10. Write a Bank Check, a Promissory Note, and a Receipt.

8. Name events connected with the following dates: 1607, 1620, 1800, 1849, and 1865.

Orthography (Time, one hour)

1. What is meant by the following: Alphabet, phonetic, orthography, etymology, and syllabication?
2. What are elementary sounds? How classified?
3. What are the following, and give examples of each: Trigraph, sub vocals, diphthong, cognate letters, linguals?
4. Give four substitutes for caret 'u'.
5. Give two rules for spelling words with final 'e.' Name two exceptions under each rule.
6. Give two uses of silent letters in spelling. Illustrate each.
7. Define the following prefixes and use in connection with a word: bi, dis, mis, pre, semi, post, non, inter, mono, sup
8. Mark diacritically and divide into syllables the following, and name the sign that indicates the sound: card, ball, mercy, sir, odd, cell, rise, blood, fare, last.
9. Use the following correctly in sentences: cite, site, sight, fane, fain, feign, vane, vain, vein, raze, raise, rays.
10. Write 10 words frequently mispronounced and indicate pronunciation by use of diacritical marks and by syllabication.

Geography (Time, one hour)

1. What is climate? Upon what does climate depend?
2. How do you account for the extremes of climate in Kansas?
3. Of what use are rivers? Of what use is the ocean?
4. Describe the mountains of North America.
5. Name and describe the following: Monrovia, Odessa, Denver, Manitoba, Hecla, Yukon, St. Helena, Juan Fernandez, Aspinwall and Orinoco
6. Name and locate the principal trade centers of the U.S.
7. Name all the republics of Europe and give the capital of each.
8. Why is the Atlantic Coast colder than the Pacific in the same latitude?
9. Describe the process by which the water of the ocean returns to the sources of rivers.
10. Describe the movements of the earth. Give the inclination of the earth.

Also note that the exam took five hours to complete. Gives the saying "she/he only had an 8th grade education" a whole new meaning, doesn't it?
